INFORMATION AND DATA PROTECTION POLICY

Aim and scope of policy

This policy applies to the processing of personal data in manual and electronic records kept by the Council in connection with its human resources function as described below. It also covers the Council's response to any data breach and other rights under the General Data Protection Regulation and current Data Protection Act.

This policy applies to the personal data of job applicants, existing and former employees, apprentices, volunteers, placement students, workers, and self-employed contractors. These are referred to in this policy as relevant individuals.

"Personal data" is information that relates to an identifiable person who can be directly or indirectly identified from that information, for example, a person's name, identification number, location, online identifier. It can also include pseudonymised data.

"Special categories of personal data" is data which relates to an individual's health, sex life, sexual orientation, race, ethnic origin, political opinion, religion, and trade union membership. It also includes genetic and biometric data (where used for ID purposes).

"Criminal offence data" is data which relates to an individual's criminal convictions and offences.

"Data processing" is any operation or set of operations which is performed on personal data or on sets of personal data, whether or not by automated means, such as collection, recording, organization, structuring, storage, adaptation or alteration, retrieval, consultation, use, disclosure by transmission, dissemination or otherwise making available, alignment or combination, restriction, erasure, or destruction.

The Council makes a commitment to ensuring that personal data, including special categories of personal data and criminal offence data (where appropriate) is processed in line with GDPR and domestic laws and all its employees conduct themselves in line with this, and other related, policies. Where third parties process data on behalf of the Council, the Council will ensure that the third party takes such measures in order to maintain the Council's commitment to protecting data. In line with current data protection legislation, the Council understands that it will be accountable for the processing, management and regulation, and storage and retention of all personal data held in the form of manual records and on computers.

In order to conduct its business, services and duties, Bury Parish Council processes a wide range of data, relating to its own operations and some of which it handles on behalf of partners. In broad terms, this data can be classified as:

- Data that is shared in the public arena about the services it offers, its mode of operations and other information it is required to make available to the public.
- Confidential information and data that is not yet in the public arena, such as ideas or policies that are being worked up.
- Confidential information about other organisations because of commercial sensitivity.



- Personal data concerning its current, past and potential employees, Councillors, and volunteers.
- Personal data concerning individuals who contact it for information, to access its services or facilities or to make a complaint.

Bury Parish Council will adopt procedures and responsibly manage all data that it handles and will respect the confidentiality of all members of the public. In some cases, it will have contractual obligations towards confidential data, but in addition will have specific legal responsibilities for personal and sensitive information under data protection legislation.

The Parish Council will periodically review and revise this policy in the light of experience, comments from data subjects and guidance from the Information Commissioners Office.

The Council will be as transparent as possible about its operations and will work closely with public, community and voluntary organisations. Therefore, in the case of all information which is not personal or confidential, The Council will be prepared to make the information available to partners and members of the Town's communities. A detail of information which is routinely available is contained in the Council's Publication Scheme, which is based on the statutory model publication scheme for local councils.

Protecting Confidential or Sensitive Information

Bury Parish Council recognises it must at times, keep and process sensitive and personal information about both employees and the public. Therefore, Bury Parish Council has adopted this policy, not only to meet its legal obligations, but to ensure high standards.

The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), which became law on 25th May 2018 and like the Data Protection Act 1998 before them, seeks to strike a balance between the rights of individuals and the sometimes, competing interests of those such as the Parish Council, with legitimate reasons for using personal information.

The policy is based on the premise that Personal Data must be:

- Processed fairly, lawfully and in a transparent manner in relation to the data subject.
- Collected for specified, explicit and legitimate purposes and not further processed in a manner that is incompatible with those purposes.
- Adequate, relevant, and limited to what is necessary in relation to the purposes for which they are processed.
- Accurate and, where necessary, kept up to date.
- Kept in a form that permits identification of data subjects for no longer than is necessary for the purposes for which the personal data are processed.
- Processed in a manner that ensures appropriate security of the personal data including protection against unauthorised or unlawful processing and against accidental loss, destruction, or damage, using appropriate technical or organisational measures.

Data Protection Terminology

Data subject - means the person whose personal data is being processed.



That may be an employee, prospective employee, associate or prospective associate of BTC or someone transacting with it in some way, or an employee, Member or volunteer with one of our clients, or persons transacting or contracting with one of our clients when we process data for them.

Personal data - means any information relating to a natural person or data subject that can be used directly or indirectly to identify the person.

It can be anything from a name, a photo, and an address, date of birth, an email address, bank details, and posts on social networking sites or a computer IP address.

Sensitive personal data - includes information about racial or ethnic origin, political opinions, and religious or other beliefs, trade union membership, medical information, sexual orientation, genetic and biometric data, or information related to offences or alleged offences where it is used to uniquely identify an individual.

Data controller - means a person who (either alone or jointly or in common with other persons) (e.g. Town Council, employer, council) determines the purposes for which and the manner in which any personal data is to be processed.

Data processor - in relation to personal data, means any person (other than an employee of the data controller) who processes the data on behalf of the data controller.

Processing information or data - means obtaining, recording, or holding the information or data or carrying out any operation or set of operations on the information or data, including:

- organising, adapting, or altering it
- retrieving, consulting, or using the information or data
- disclosing the information or data by transmission, dissemination or otherwise making it available
- aligning, combining, blocking, erasing, or destroying the information or data. regardless of the Technology used.

Bury Parish Council processes **personal data** in order to:

- Fulfil its duties as an employer, by complying with the terms of contracts of employment, safeguarding the employee and maintaining information required by law.
- Pursue the legitimate interests of its business and its duties as a public body, by fulfilling contractual terms with other organisations, and maintaining information required by law.
- Monitor its activities including the equality and diversity of its activities
- Fulfil its duties in operating the business premises including security
- Assist regulatory and law enforcement agencies
- Process information including the recording and updating details about its Councillors, employees, partners, and volunteers.
- Process information including the recording and updating details about individuals who contact it for information, or to access a service, or make a complaint.
- Undertake surveys, censuses, and questionnaires to fulfil the objectives and purposes of the Council.
- Undertake research, audit, and quality improvement work to fulfil its objects and purposes.
- Carry out Council administration.



Where appropriate and governed by necessary safeguards, we will carry out the above processing jointly with other appropriate bodies, from time to time.

The Council will ensure that at least one of the following conditions is met for personal information to be considered fairly processed:

- The individual has consented to the processing
- Processing is necessary for the performance of a contract or agreement with the individual
- Processing is required under a legal obligation
- Processing is necessary to protect the vital interests of the individual
- Processing is necessary to carry out public functions
- Processing is necessary in order to pursue the legitimate interests of the data controller or third parties.

Particular attention is paid to the processing of any **sensitive personal information** and the Town Council will ensure that at least one of the following conditions is met:

- Explicit consent of the individual
- Required by law to process the data for employment purposes
- A requirement in order to protect the vital interests of the individual or another person

Who is responsible for protecting a person's personal data?

The Parish Council as a corporate body has ultimate responsibility for ensuring compliance with the Data Protection legislation. The Council has delegated this responsibility day to day to the Parish Clerk.

Diversity Monitoring



Bury Parish Council monitors the diversity of its employees, and Councillors, in order to ensure that there is no inappropriate or unlawful discrimination in the way it conducts its activities. It undertakes similar data handling in respect of prospective employees. This data will always be treated as confidential. It will only be accessed by authorised individuals within the Council and will not be disclosed to any other bodies or individuals. Diversity information will never be used as selection criteria and will not be made available to others involved in the recruitment process. Anonymised data derived from diversity monitoring will be used for monitoring purposes and may be published and passed to other bodies.

The Council will always give guidance on personnel data to employees, councillors, partners, and volunteers through a Privacy Notice and ensure that individuals on whom personal information is kept are aware of their rights and have easy access to that information on request.

Appropriate technical and organisational measures will be taken against Unauthorised or unlawful processing of personal data and against accidental loss or destruction of, or damage to, personal data.

Personal data shall not be transferred to a country or territory outside the European Economic Areas unless that country or territory ensures an adequate level of protection for the rights and freedoms of data subjects concerning the processing of personal data.

Information provided to us

The information provided (personal information such as name, address, email address, and phone number) will be processed and stored so that we can contact, respond to, or conduct the transaction requested by the individual. By transacting with Bury Parish

Council, individuals are deemed to be giving consent for their personal data provided to be used and transferred by this policy, however, wherever possible, specific written consent will be sought. It is the responsibility of those individuals to ensure that the Parish Council can keep their data accurate and up to date. The personal information will be not shared or provided to any other third party or be used for any purpose other than that for which it was provided.

The Councils Right to Process Information

General Data Protection Regulations (and Data Protection Act) Article 6 (1) (a) (b) and (e)
Processing is with the consent of the data subject, or
Processing is necessary for compliance with a legal obligation.
Processing is necessary for the legitimate interests of the Council.

Information Security

The Parish Council cares to ensure the security of personal data. We make sure that your information is protected from unauthorised access, loss, manipulation, falsification, destruction, or unauthorised disclosure. This is done through appropriate technical measures and appropriate policies.

We will only keep your data for the purpose it was collected for and only for as long as necessary, after which it will be deleted.



Children

We will not process any data relating to a child (under 13) without the express parental/ guardian consent of the child concerned.

Rights of a Data Subject

Access to Information: an individual has the right to request access to the information we have on them. They can do this by contacting our Town Clerk or Data Protection Officer:

Information Correction: If they believe that the information, we have about them is incorrect, they may contact us so that we can update it and keep their data accurate. Please contact The Parish Clerk.

Information Deletion: If the individual wishes the Parish Council to delete the information about them, they can do so by contacting the Parish Clerk.

Right to Object: If an individual believes their data is not being processed for the purpose it has been collected for, they may object by contacting the Parish Clerk or Data Protection Officer.

The Parish Council does not use automated decision-making or profiling of individual personal data.

Complaints: If an individual has a complaint regarding the way their data has been processed, they may make a complaint to the Parish Clerk, Data Protection Officer, or the Information Commissioners Office casework@ico.org.uk Tel: 0303 123 1113.

The Council will always give guidance on personnel data to employees through the Employee handbook.

The Council will ensure that individuals on whom personal information is kept are aware of their rights and have easy access to that information on request.

Making Information Available

The Publication Scheme is a means by which the Council can make a significant amount of information available routinely, without waiting for someone to specifically request it. The scheme is intended to encourage local people to take an interest in the work of the Council and its role within the community.

By the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this Scheme specifies the classes of information which the Council publishes or intends to publish. It is supplemented with an Information Guide which will give greater detail of what the Council will make available and hopefully make it easier for people to access it.

All formal meetings of the Council and its committees are subject to statutory notice being given on notice boards, and the Website and sent to the local media. The Council publishes an annual programme in May each year. All formal meetings are open to the public and press and reports on those meetings and relevant background papers are available for the public to see. The Council



welcomes public participation and has a public participation session at each Council and committee meeting. Details can be seen in the Council's Standing Orders, which are available on its Website or at its Offices. Occasionally, the Council or committees may need to consider matters in private. Examples of this are matters involving personal details of staff, or a particular member of the public, or where details of commercial/contractual sensitivity are to be discussed. This will only happen after a formal resolution has been passed to exclude the press and public and reasons for the decision are stated. Minutes from all formal meetings, including the confidential parts are public documents.

The Openness of Local Government Bodies Regulations 2014 requires written records to be made of certain decisions taken by officers under delegated powers. These are not routine operational and administrative decisions such as giving instructions to the workforce or paying an invoice approved by the Council but would include urgent action taken after consultation with the Chairman, such as responding to a planning application in advance of Council. In other words, decisions would have been made by Council or committee had the delegation not been in place.

The 2014 Regulations also amend the Public Bodies (Admission to Meetings) Act 1960 to allow the public or press to film, photograph, or make an audio recording of council and committee meetings normally open to the public. The Council will where possible facilitate such recording unless it is disruptive. It will also take steps to ensure that children, the vulnerable and members of the public who object to being filmed are protected without undermining the broader purpose of the meeting. The Council will be pleased to make special arrangements on request for persons who do not have English as their first language or those with hearing or sight difficulties.

Disclosure Information

The Council will as necessarily undertake checks on both staff and Members with the Disclosure and Barring Service and will comply with their Code of Conduct relating to the secure storage, handling, use, retention and disposal of Disclosures and Disclosure Information. It will include an appropriate operating procedure in its integrated quality management system.

Data Transparency

The Council has resolved to act by the Code of Recommended Practice for Local Authorities on Data Transparency (September 2011). This sets out the key principles for local authorities in creating greater transparency through the publication of public data and is intended to help them meet the obligations of the legislative framework concerning the information.

“Public data” means the objective, factual data on which policy decisions are based and on which public services are assessed, or which is collected or generated in the course of public service delivery.

The Code will therefore underpin the Council's decisions on the release of public data and ensure it is proactive in pursuing higher standards and responding to best practices as it develops. The principles of the Code are:

Demand led: new technologies and publication of data should support transparency and accountability

Open: the provision of public data will be integral to the Council's engagement with residents so that it drives accountability to them.



Timely: data will be published as soon as possible following production.

The Government has also issued a further Code of Recommended Practice on Transparency, compliance with which is compulsory for parish councils with turnover (gross income or gross expenditure) not exceeding £25,000 per annum. These councils will be exempt from the requirement to have an external audit from April 2017. (Your Council Name) exceeds this turnover but will nevertheless ensure the following information is published on its Website for ease of access:

- All transactions above £100.
- End-of-year accounts
- Annual Governance Statements
- Internal Audit Reports
- List of Councillor or Member responsibilities
- Details of public land and building assets
- Draft minutes of Council and committees within one month
- Agendas and associated papers no later than three clear days before the meeting.
